Happy New Year everyone. As I write this and as you read it, we have passed the average coldest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere (January 20) and the days are getting "longer". It won't be long now, folks. Spring is coming.

The winter season is slower in a number of ways, but we did begin the year with our annual

Greenway-led New Year's Day hike. This year, we chose a 4-mile loop in Richland through Johnson Park and down to the Duportail Bridge. It was largely under gray skies offering little contrast, but we were able to evaluate stretches of the trail, assess needed maintenance and improvements, and evaluate the overall condition of things through that small corridor of the Tapteal Greenway.

Later in the month I hosted the Board of Directors in my home for a dedicated strategic planning session. We hadn't done that in several years, and it is an exercise that I think is good on an annual or biennial basis. We covered a lot of material in 2+ hours. I tried to frame our discussion with the following themes or intents:

- An evaluation of the overall state and condition of the Tapteal Greenway organization
- A focus on our purpose and goals, making sure that we understand what those are
- A discussion of our portfolio of projects, events, and activities to make sure those are still aligned with the purpose and goals
- A prioritization of those projects, events, and activities for 2023 and beyond

I thought our time together went really well, and "strategic planning" will be a small part of each board meeting throughout the year so that we can sustain the benefits of the exercise and keep them current.

In addition to general discussion, we concentrated on four main topics ~

<u>Projects</u>: We have a lot on our plate for a small organization. We discussed major projects for 2023 through a lens focused on urgency and need, our capacity for follow-through and completion, and how various projects address our purpose and goals.

Events: Events and activities require a lot of organizational throughput, but they are our best way of getting the membership and community involved. We are going to do a better job of maintaining and sharing our calendar so that all of you know what is going on and how you can participate.

Policy: We carefully choose which community debates and policy matters we get involved in. That approach has served us well over our first quarter-century. Nonetheless, there are some big issues coming in 2023, such as the disposition of the Bateman Island causeway, use and abuse of our public lands, and the use of electric bicycles on trails. We will do our best to keep you informed on these types of issues and how the Greenway may weigh in.

<u>Organizational Development</u>: Growth of the membership, the volunteer corps, and the board of directors are all goals of mine for 2023. We haven't made these a priority for a long time. We also are going to invest renewed focus on our relationships with partner organizations and with local governments.

Finally, we all concurred that we need to do a better job of communicating with the membership (YOU!). You will see four full newsletters this year, better and more focused email and social media engagement, and a general effort to get the Greenway name and purpose out into the community.

Thank you again to all of you for your continued support of the Tapteal Greenway. I look forward to seeing you on the trail, on the water, or in the classroom in 2023.

Eagle Scout Grayhawk Project

During the Grayhawk development in Horn Rapids a large area heading towards the river was graded over and left devoid of vegetation. In the fall of 2019, we established the first native plant garden to restore a portion of this area. We expanded the planting area the following year. In 2021, we focused on replacing and adding plants in these two areas.

Aubrey Brandstetter of BSA Troop 2 expanded the planting area this past year for her Eagle Scout Project. Her first work day involved weeding and placing landscape rocks along the border. The actual planting took place during the second work party. The plants installed were Munro's Globernallow, Snow Buckwheat, Sand Penstemon, Common Yarrow, Sand Dropseed and Needle & Thread Grass.

The final touch was the 'planting' of about thirty seedballs. The plants seeded were Munro's Globemallow, Common Yarrow, Blue Mountain Prairie Clover and Green Rabbitbrush.

Pamela and Scott Woodward Conservation Scholarship

Applications for the 2023-24 academic year are being accepted through April 28 for the Pamela and Scott Woodward Conservation Scholarship. This \$2,000 merit-based scholarship was created by Tapteal Greenway in 2016 in honor of the years of dedicated service to the local community by Pamela and Scott, both as teachers and as active members of Tapteal Greenway.

Applications are available on the Three Rivers Community Foundation and Tapteal Greenway websites (3rcf.org under Scholarships and tapteal.org under Scholarship). Recipients have to be a resident of Benton or Franklin County and pursuing their post-high school education in Washington State (full eligibility requirements are listed in the application).

The scholarship's endowment is held and managed by the Three Rivers Community Foundation (they also administer the scholarship). The scholarship was created with an initial endowment of \$25,000. With last year's market downturn, the endowment has dropped from \$48,000 to \$40,000. Such market fluctuations are to be expected but as this scholarship is intended to be perpetually self-funding, we would like to continually increase the endowment. Donations can be made directly to the Three Rivers Community Foundation or through Tapteal Greenway. In either case, make sure to indicate that the donation is for the Woodward Scholarship.

Youth Ecology Education Through Restoration

Two years ago the Washington Native Plant Society launched the Youth Ecology Education through Restoration (YEER) program. The YEER program integrates a four-to-six week middle school NGSS-aligned science curriculum with a field restoration project.

Last spring Tapteal Greenway made a donation to cover the cost of adding Ray Reynolds Middle School to the program. Over two days last November 100 7th grade students were bused from Ray Reynolds to the Rattlesnake Wildlife Area to plant almost 600 native plants for their restoration project. After plots were laid out for each group of four students, they weeded their plots (mostly removing tumbleweed and tumble mustard) and then each student planted four species from a list of sixteen native plants.

In addition to learning about our local shrub-steppe habitat, this program provides a rare field trip opportunity for the students. Thanks to Washington Native Plant Society for initial funding of the program, Gretchen Graber as the Eastern Washington Program Coordinator and Brandon Hoeft for taking on the challenge of adding the program to his curriculum.

May 13 - **Tapteal Greenway 50K Run or Paddle**.
